THE FOUNDATION (FAMILY)

- The foundation of the Fonofale is also known as the floor of the fale
- The floor represents the FAMILY, which is the foundation of all Pacific Island Cultures.
- The family can be immediate family members as well as an extended family or constituted family that are bind by kinship, titles, marriage, partnership or covenant.
- The history and gafa or genealogy is in the foundation/floor/family which ties them to titles, lands, motu/island, sea and to the Gods of the Pacific as well as to other cultures.
